


Will I have academic work to do?

Everyone will have department talks during Freshers' Week. It is important you go to these so make sure you check when they are! The amount of academic work you may have in Freshers' Week varies by department, but it will not be anything too intense. More often than not it will just be a small amount of work to introduce you to your modules.

How expensive is Fresher's Week?

How expensive Freshers' Week will vary depending on what you decide to do throughout the week. The Freshers' Week events in the schedule above are included in the JCR Levy meaning that you don't have to worry about paying club entry etc. The rest of the expenses are up to you really i.e., whether you buy drinks in the clubs, whether you go out for lunch with your new friends in the city etc. My only piece of advice, remember you do need to have enough money to last the rest of term!





THE CURVES

Aptly named because of the curvature of this wing of college, the Curves has two floors and is known for being a very sociable area of college. The Curves has a mixture of both shared and single-bed rooms. It has shared bathrooms and kitchens. Each Curve has 6 shared bathrooms (3 male and 3 female) which contain two showers, two loos and two sinks. Additionally, each floor

Additionally, each floor has two shared kitchens, a large one and a small one. Those living in the Curves have a laundry room just outside the entrance to the wing.

THE STRAIGHTS

The Straights, once again very creatively named due to this area of college being formed from straight corridors, has three floors. All the rooms in this area of college are single single-bed rooms and have shared bathrooms and kitchens like the Curves. There is 1 shared kitchen and 2 shared bathrooms (1 male and 1 female) on each floor of the Straights. Those in the Straights share a laundry room with the Curves.

THE HOUSES

The Houses - you've guessed it! - are 14 houses located at the back of college. The Houses are not connected to the main building. No rooms in the Houses are shared and there are a mixture of single single-bed rooms with shared bathrooms and single double-bed rooms with ensuites. Each house has a shared kitchen. If you live in the Houses, you share a laundry room with the others living in the Houses.





What to bring to Aidan's!

Essential: Bedding (pillows, duvet, mattress topper, sheets, blankets etc.), towels, toiletries and medication, stationary and bag to carry your laptop/any books to classes, clothing, coats, shoes, formal wear (note: anything goes at Aidan's. This could be black tie, or something more casual. Just whatever you feel comfortable in.), coat hangers, photo ID and any important docs, debit cards and cash, decorations (posters, photos, battery-operated fairy lights), snacks.

Optional: Laptop/Computer, printer, cups, glasses, crockery & cutlery, cooking utensils, sports/hobby equipment, Bluetooth speaker, headphones.

Not permitted: Door wedges; fridges; large televisions; portable heaters; mains powered fairy lights; candles or incense; pets or animals; drinking games or paraphernalia; hotplates; combination ovens; toastie makers; coffee machines; rice cookers; pressure cookers; slow cookers.

If you are not sure whether something is not permitted, please check the Livers In Guide.

General Facilities

St Aidan's has a fantastic range of leisure facilities available for you to use. We have a **multipurpose court** and a **music room** that are avaliable to book out for free. The college also has a multi-faith and meditation room. We also have a **college gym** open for any Aidanites with memberships to use. The gym has lots of equipment and it is a very convenient way to fit in a workout. Information on gym membership and how to pay for it will be sent out soon.

At Aidan's, we are lucky to have a 24/7 college library with lots of desk space, computers and a printer alongside a small collection of books. The college library really stands out because of its stunning view of Durham Cathedral!

CATERING

St Aidan's is a fully catered college meaning three meals a day are provided for you in the Dining Hall. At each meal, there are always lots of main course options and a variety of sides to go with it. Our wonderful catering staff cater to all dietary requirements from vegetarian and vegan to allergies to religious requirements. If you do have any requirements or queries, do ask the catering staff to help you.

I know a lot of you will be a little nervous about being catered as it inevitably involves finding somewhere and someone to sit with to eat meals. I assure you after the first few days, these worries will disperse. Everyone will feel the same way and within no time you will have found people to sit with, whether it be your roommate, someone from your corridor or simply people you've met on a night out. In fact, some of my fondest memories from college are from the Dining Hall whether it was us joking around, collectively grumbling about deadlines or simply discussing what our plans were for the evening. I assure you it will all be alright and if you want someone to sit with initially, please come and sit with us FREPs as we will be in the Dining Hall in Freshers' Week!

Even though we are a catered college, each area of college accommodation has a shared kitchen, so if you do fancy cooking for yourself everyone once in a while you can!

THE BAR

At Durham, each college has a bar. Here at Aidan's, our college bar is located just behind the Dining Hall and has an amazing Beer Garden with a stunning view of the Cathedral. Aidan's Bar is a great place to socialise whether you drink or not as it serves both alcoholic and non-alcoholic drinks and holds many different events. It is used as a bar (obviously...), a place to watch sports and events like Eurovision, a place for college sports and societies socials, and a place for bar events such as the Summer Festival! The bar is run by Karen, who is the loveliest and most helpful person, and she is always open to new events and socials being run in the space. A video should have been circulated telling you how to use the laundry rooms located next to F House and B Curve. Any problems find one of the Frep Team to try and help you






How do I collect letters/parcels?

WHAT IS THE JCR? A QUICK SUMMARY

The JCR is a central part of your college and university experience, so let me fill you in on what a JCR is and what it can do for you. The term 'JCR' stands for Junior Common Room. The JCR is a **student organisation** that puts students at **the center of the decision-making process** as well as providing student welfare services, events like formals and balls & the funds for college sports and societies. These events and services are student-central. They are organised and run by students and decisions regarding them are made either by elections or elected committees.

At Durham, each college has a JCR. Every college JCR is structured and run completely differently and these differences create a unique identity for each JCR. Here at Aidan's, the St Aidan's Junior Common Room (SA JCR) is both a physical space and a student run charity whose members are both undergraduate and postgraduate Aidanites.



The Physical JCR

The JCR is located between the 'Plodge' (Porters' Lodge) and the Dining Hall, and it is the center of college life as it is a multipurpose space used for a range of events and functions.

On the average day, Aidanites often use the JCR as a space to chill, study and hang out with friends. But, the JCR is also the space where we host various events throughout the year. Each term, several JCR meetings, live lounges and karaoke nights are held within the JCR and on more special occasions, it is turned into a college wedding chapel or a silent disco and so much more!

The JCR contains various facilities too. It is home to vending machines, several indoor sports facilities (pool tables, a table tennis table and darts boards), a Wii, beanbags and – most importantly – the Aidan's Shop!





After years of hard work, the St Aidan's JCR has recently become – like some other JCRs at Durham – an independent registered charity. As a charitable incorporated organisation (CIO), the SA JCR is independent from the college. Although we still collaborate and work alongside the college, this independence means that the JCR is truly a student organisation run by students for students.

Our objectives as a charity are to:

1. Promote the interests and welfare of students at St Aidan's College.

2. Be recognised as a representative channel between students and St Aidan's College and other external bodies.

3. Provide social, sporting, cultural and recreational activities and forums for discussion and debate for students at St Aidan's.

Put simply, the SAJCR has three main roles: a representational body for the students at St Aidan's, an events management organisation & a sports and leisure organisation. Being a representational body means that the JCR supports and 'sticks up' for students at St Aidan's whether that be at college, at the Students' Union or even at a university level regarding a wide range of things. Essentially, this means that we are on your side and here to help you.

Events management involves organising and funding things like formals and balls & student welfare services.

Last but certainly not least, being a sports and leisure organisation means that the JCR funds and organises the many sporting and socieities opportunities available at St Aidan's. The JCR funds these through the money raised from the JCR Levy.

The Levy

JCR Levy is a one-time payment of £200.00 that covers your entire degree – up until the day you graduate. The Levy is a voluntary payment, but we would encourage all new Aidanites to pay it so that they can becomes members who benefit from its perks and fully immerse into college life.

JCR DEMOCRACY A QUICK SUMMARY

As mentioned, the JCR is run by students for students. There are three levels of student involvement in the JCR structure:

1. Trustees:

As a charity, the JCR has a Board of Trustees who ensure that it runs smoothly and that the JCR Exec comply to regulations. This Board consist of both external trustees (non-students) and student trustees. The student trustees include three members of the JCR Exec (President; Compliance Officer; Treasurer) and a Student Trustee elected by JCR members. Having current Aidanites on the Board of Trustees means we can ensure that our voice is recognised and considered.

2. JCR Executive Committee & Committees:

The JCR Executive Committee – better known as the Exec – consists of Aidanites who have been elected by the members of the JCR to undertake their roles. Except for the President (a graduate in a paid sabbatical role), the Exec are all student volunteers who work hard to ensure you have the best experiences. We organize everything from sports to formals to tech to the college magazine. You will shortly be given a 'whose who' of the Exec and their specific role for the JCR.

The members of the Exec each run a committee relating to their role. Each committee is structured and run differently and has different roles within it, with its members being either interviewed or elected. These committees' members are integral to the functioning of the JCR and the events that are put on. The committee each Exec member runs is mentioned in their introduction but if you want more information about specific committees then check out the JCR website or contact the Exec member who runs the committee your interested in!

3. JCR Meetings & Elections:

All the members of the JCR have their voices and opinions heard at the JCR meetings held throughout the year. These meeting are chaired by our JCR Chair, Emma. At JCR meetings, Exec Officer Reports are given on what members of the Exec have recently been working on, announcement of events and relevant updates. Then Motions can be proposed by any member of the JCR about anything from setting up a society to proposing something for the JCR to buy to introducing a greener policy. Then Husts and Elections for positions are given by those running. Finally the Meeting is rounded with with AOBS (any other business).

There are three JCR Meetings in Michaelmas and Epiphany term & two in Easter term held on a Sunday evening in the JCR. I would highly recommend going to the meetings to ensure that democracy is upheld but also because you also get free pizza!

JCR CHAIR: EMMA MERCER

Hi everyone! I'm Emma, the JCR Chair, and I'm responsible for the democratic running of the JCR, overseeing everything to ensure fairness whilst upholding our operating policies and procedures. The Chair is also in charge of running JCR meetings and interviews for all JCR positions so don't hesitate to reach out (chair@st-aidans.com).

SOCIALS CHAIR: ELYS WALKER

Hi, my names Elys and I'm the socials chair for 2024. As socials chair, I'm the head of the Socials Committee (SocCom for short!) and we organise and run a variety of JCR events, such as Winter ball, Summer Ball and college marriages. Keep an eye on our instagrams (estaidanssocials and estaidansballs) for all the information about our events!





COMPLIANCE OFFICER: MARTHA DEYERMOND

My role splits into two main responsibilities. The first is as a trustee on the JCR's board. The second is as a member of the Executive Committee. Within both roles, I have to ensure that we comply (it's in the name!) with charity law and our governing documents. Outside of this, I help plan for the future and manage the charity's operation, while guaranteeing our independence and democratic values are protected. We have a wide range of Sports and Societies on offer at Aidan's which everyone can get involved with. ST AIDANS WELFARE


Welcome to the St Aidan's College community! As the JCR welfare committee, we want to introduce ourselves and explain what we do.

CAMPUS LOCATIONS ALL THE INFO YOU NEED

Teaching & Learning Centre

The Teaching & Learning Centre – referred to as the TLC – is located opposite the Science Site and next to Mary's. It is an alternative study space to the Billy B and is often considered the more chill of the two. However, the TLC does not contain any academic texts. You may also have some lectures and seminars in the TLC. Walk time from Aidan's approx. 8 minutes.

Science Site

If you are studying STEM or Human Sciences, most of your lectures and tutorials will take place at buildings located at the Science Site. Walk time from Aidan's approx. 10 minutes.



Student Union

For Humanities students, some of your lectures will be held in the Students' Union building, a famous example of brutalist architecture. The SU Building also has study spaces and a café-bar which has pool tables and darts boards. Walk time from Aidan's approx. 20 minutes.

The Bill Bryson Library

Located on the Science Site, the Bill Bryson – more affectionately known as the Billy B – is Durham's main library. It has 1800 student study spaces located across 4 floors. There are collaborative work spaces, computer spaces and you can even book private study rooms. The Billy B is home to thousands of academic texts and will likely become a second home to humanities students. It is also where you can access help from the IT Services Help Desk. Walk time from Aidan's approx. 10 minutes


Palace Green

Palace Green is located between the Cathedral and Durham Castle. It is the location of most of the Arts and Humanities departments like History, Music, Classics and Theology. There is also a smaller library on Palace Green, however the departments on Palace Green often have there own small libraries for students studying their subject. Walk time from Aidan's approx. 15-25 depending on the route taken.

DURHAM ALL THE INFO YOU NEED

Nightline

A confidential listening service which is open everyday during term time from 9pm to 7am. You can anonymously use this service to talk through any problems with someone on the other side of the line simply being there to listen to you. Think of it as a safe place where you can vent whatever you may be feeling. Their phone number is on the back of your campus card and it may be a good idea to add it as a contact in your phone.





Night-cab

This is a taxi service run by the SU which operates within a two-mile radius of Durham city centre. This service offers a way to get you home safely in the evening. It runs from 9pm to 2am Monday to Saturday and 9pm to 11pm on a Sunday in term time, and costs £3 a person. It may be useful to put their phone number (07922 648802) in your phone just in case you need it.

DURHAM ALL THE INFO YOU NEED

The Student's Union

As a Durham student you are automatically a member of the Students' Union (SU). The SU is democratically run, with its officers being elected by the students. The decisions of the SU are undertaken through elections voted upon by representatives from each college.

The SU offers lots of university wide societies which you can join. These range from academic to arts to food & drink to religious and so much more. These societies are a great way to make friends outside of college as well as a brilliant way to either continue a passion you already have or find a new one! You will get a chance to find out more about the societies the SU offer at the SU Freshers' Fair on Wednesday 20/09, but of course before then you can always look at the SU website (durhamsu.com) to learn more about the societies available for you to join!

Associations

The SU Associations provide university-wide representation for traditionally underrepresented groups or those who have been frequently subject to discrimination. There are associations for: People of Colour; International Students; LGBT+ Students; Trans Students; Students with Disabilities; Mature Students; Working Class Students. They provide a space where students who identify with one or more of these groups can come together, discuss issues affecting them and campaign to improve their student experience. Honourable mentions: Riverview Kitchen and Vennels.


PUBS
